Types of Elections

- There are 3 different ways to conduct an election
 - Poll Place
 - Vote Center
 - Mail Ballot
 - Possible legislation this year to allow for mail ballot election for the Primary and General because the situation with no equipment having yet been certified by the state.

Poll Place Elections

- General Information
 - Poll places are open 7am 7pm Election Day
 - El Paso County has 189 poll places
 - Schools, churches and community centers are the most common poll places
 - When holding a poll place election, the county is also responsible for administering absentee and early voting

Challenges

- Locating poll places
- Delivering/picking up equipment
- In 2006 there has to be 1 DRE in every poll place
- Election judges
- Staffing and training of staff for early voting locations

Poll Places

- All poll places have to be handicap accessible
 - Money spent to make poll places accessible
 - \bullet 2004 = \$26,604.10
 - \bullet 2005 = \$2,239.40
 - Total = \$28,843.50
 - HAVA Grants Received
 - Total = \$26,860
 - Total county spending = \$1,983.50
 - Purchases included
 - Ramps (regular & threshold)
 - Doorbells
 - Cones (regular & channelizer)
 - Signs (handicap, cross walk, access route)
 - Mats

Poll Places

- Cost
 - Currently El Paso County doesn't pay for the use of any poll places
 - We anticipate having to pay for some locations in the future
- Difficulty locating poll places
- Delivering/Picking up equipment
 - Distribution center spends two weeks on each task
 - Other counties pay moving companies to move their equipment

Direct Record Electronic

- HAVA requires one DRE that will accommodate the needs of persons with disabilities in every poll place by 1/1/06.
- Currently there are no DRE's certified for this purpose.
- El Paso County currently has 80 DRE's, all of which will need replaced.
- With 189 polling locations the anticipated cost of this equipment is approximately \$1,122,000 -\$1,300,000.
- Anticipated HAVA funds available for El Paso County for these purchases is \$1,139,250.

Election Judges (poll place only)

- 1,766 election judges are required to fully staff the polling places in 2006
 - 1 vote center supply judge per poll place = 189
 - 2 provisional judges per poll place = 378
 - 1 precinct supply judge per precinct = 385
 - 2 regular judges per precinct = 770
 - 1 greeter per poll place that has three or more precincts = 44
- Total Cost = \$203,780
- We use many student election judges and have just started a huge push to recruit many more this year
 - Our goal is to have 1 Student in each precinct
 - HB 06-1142 would allow us to pay the student judges as much as the regular judges.
- It is challenging to recruit and train 1,766 judges to work on election day
- Major initiative in 2006 to recruit student election judges

Equipment Testing

- The DEO has to conduct at least three tests including:
 - A hardware test
 - A public logic and accuracy test
 - This test is open to the public
 - 7 days prior to the public test a notice must be posted
 - A post election test or audit
- Each type of ballot has to be tested including:
 - Absentee
 - Early voting
 - Provisional
 - Precinct
 - Audio ballots

Absentee Ballots

While we are coordinating everything required to accommodate our poll places, we are also have these other statutory functions going on.

- Absentee Balloting
 - Colorado offers no-excuse absentee voting.
 - Voters are required to request an absentee ballot in writing for each new year of elections.
 - Prior to election day
 - Absentee ballot drop sites are available at the Clerk & Recorder's branch offices.
 - Absentee ballots are delivered daily to the downtown location.
 - On Election Day
 - We offer curb-side drop off at the Clerk & Recorder's branch offices.

Absentee Ballots Continued

- What we do
 - Order the ballots
 - Secure the ballots
 - Process absentee ballot requests
 - Send out absentee ballots nightly beginning approximately 30 days before the election
 - Hire absentee ballot judges
 - Process ballots as they come in
 - Signature verification
 - Preprocessing
 - Counting
 - Balance everything at the end and present to canvass

Early Voting

- Currently El Paso County offers 3 early voting locations
 - Centennial Hall
 - Chapel Hills DMV
 - Powers DMV
- In 2006 we are adding 3 more early voting locations
 - Falcon area
 - Monument area
 - Fountain/Security/Widefield area
- Early voting is available Monday Friday one week prior to a Primary Election and two weeks prior to a General Election.
- It would take approximately 5-7 days to set up 6 early voting locations.

Early Voting Continued

- What do we do
 - Hire election judges
 - Conduct an early voting judges training class
 - Hire and train temporary staff to work at the branches
 - Balance each of the locations daily
 - Balance everything at the end and present to canvass

TABOR

- TABOR requires political subdivisions to accept pro and con comments concerning ballot issues.
- The political subdivisions submit the pro/con summaries to the Clerk & Recorder.
- The Clerk & Recorder is responsible for summarizing the county pro/Con statements.
- The Clerk & Recorder is responsible for preparing the TABOR notice.
- The TABOR notice must be mailed to all active registered voters at least 30 days before a ballot issue election.

Ballot Order

- The ballot is certified to us 60 days before a Primary and 57 days before a General.
- Ballots are ordered approximately 50 days before the election.
